



YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN ARIZONA

Election Day: Tuesday, November 6, 2018

Who Can Vote?

- In order to vote in the election on November 6, you must be registered to vote. If you are not already registered to vote, you must register by October 9, 2018. If you register by mail, your registration needs to be postmarked no later than October 9, 2018, or received no later than 5 days from October 9, 2018. - To register to vote:
 - You must live in Arizona, be a U.S. citizen, and be 18 years of age or older on Election Day.
 - Register online at: <https://servicearizona.com/webapp/evoter/selectLanguage>.
- You cannot register to vote if:
 - You have been convicted of a felony and your civil rights have not been restored; or
 - You have been declared “mentally incompetent” by a court.

When do I vote?

- Early voting begins on October 10, 2018, and ends on November 2, 2018.
- On Election Day, Tuesday, November 6, the polls are open 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. Any voter who is in line to vote at 7 p.m. on Election Day will be allowed to vote.

Where do I vote?

- During early voting, you may vote at any early voting location in your county. Check with your county.
- On Election Day, you must vote at your local polling place. Find your polling place at: <https://voter.azsos.gov/VoterView/PollingPlaceSearch.do>.

Will I need to bring identification?

- Yes. You must show identification (ID) to vote at the polling place. If you do not have ID, you may still vote if you bring your voter registration card or other documents showing your name and address. Please look here for more information: <https://www.azsos.gov/elections/voting-election>.

Can I bring someone to help me vote?

- Yes. If you need help reading in English, you can bring a person of your choice into the voting booth to help you vote. You can bring any person that you want except your employer or your union representative.

Can I receive assistance in Spanish?

- Yes. You are entitled to a Spanish language ballot and assistance in Spanish in the following counties: Maricopa, Pima, Santa Cruz and Yuma.

Can I vote by mail?

- Any registered voter may vote early by mail instead of going to the polls on Election Day. For instructions on how to vote by mail in Arizona, visit: <http://www.azsos.gov/elections>.

What if my name is not on the list of voters?

- If your name is not on the list, or there is a problem with your ID, you have the right to vote on a provisional ballot. Be sure to ask for a provisional ballot if there is a problem at the polling place.
