



YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN COLORADO

Election Day: Tuesday, November 6, 2018

Who can vote?

- In order to vote in the election on November 6, you must be registered to vote. If you are not already registered to vote, you can register in person even on Election Day. You can find out if you are registered here: www.sos.state.co.us/voter-classic/pages/pub/olvr/findVoterReg.xhtml.
- You can register to vote by mail or online until October 29. To register in person, you can visit a polling location in your county through Election Day. Learn more at: <http://www.sos.state.co.us/pubs/elections/FAQs/VoterRegistrationFAQ.html>.
- To register to vote:
 - You must live in Colorado, be a U.S. citizen, and be age 18 or older on Election Day.
 - You must also not be serving a sentence (including parole) for a felony.

When do I vote?

- Early voting begins October 22. Early voting locations are open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.
- On Election Day, Tuesday, November 6, the polls are open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Can I vote by mail?

- Yes, all voters in Colorado are now sent mail ballots and can vote by mail if they choose not to vote in person.
- No later than 7 p.m. on Election Day, your mail ballot must either be *received* in the mail by the county clerk or dropped off at one of the locations listed here: www.sos.state.co.us/pubs/elections/Resources/CountyElectionOffices.html.

Where do I vote in person?

How do I vote in person?

- All voters who go in person to the polling place must provide ID or show a bill with the voter's name and address. The address on your ID does not have to match your voter registration but does have to show a Colorado address.

Can I bring someone to help me vote?

- Yes. If you need help reading in English, you can bring a person into the voting booth to help you vote. You can bring any person that you want except your employer or your union representative. The person you bring does not need to be a registered voter.

Can I receive assistance in Spanish?

- Yes. In Colorado, you are entitled to assistance in Spanish from someone who speaks Spanish and English. Voters in Costilla, Denver and Rio Grande Counties have the right to receive ballots, instructions and all other voting materials in Spanish.

What if my name is not on the list of voters?

- If your name is not on the list, or there is a problem with your ID, you have the right to vote on a provisional ballot. Be sure to ask for a provisional ballot if there is a problem at the polling place.
