



YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN UTAH

Election Day: Tuesday, November 6, 2018

Who can vote?

- In order to vote in the election on November 6, you must be registered to vote. If you are not already registered to vote, you must register by mail by October 9 or you can register online or at your county clerk's office before October 30. You can find out if you are registered by dialing 1-801-530-4849 or visit: www.vote.utah.gov.

- You can also register during the Early Voting Period or on Election Day at a polling location.
- To register to vote:
 - You must live in Utah, be a U.S. citizen, and be age 18 or older on Election Day;
 - You must have been a resident of Utah for at least the 30 days immediately before the election.
 - You must also not be serving a sentence for a felony conviction.

When do I vote?

- In-person early voting begins on October 23, 2018 and ends on November 2, 2018.
- Election Day is Tuesday, November 6, 2018. The polls are open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.
- If you are voting by mail, complete and postmark your ballot by November 5, 2018 or drop it off at your county clerk's office on Election Day.

Where do I vote?

- Any registered voter in Utah can request a mail ballot and vote by mail.
- In some counties, every registered voter is automatically sent a mail ballot; however, even those counties must open at least one vote center on Election Day for people who prefer to cast their vote in person or drop off their mail ballot in person. Contact your county for details.
- If you live in certain counties, you may also vote early in-person at a voting location. Find early polling locations, by county, at: <https://vote.utah.gov/vote/app/earlyVoting/index.html>.

How do I vote in person?

- At the polls, you must present an unexpired photo ID or two other documents with your name and *current* address. To check the list of acceptable forms of ID, visit: <https://vote.utah.gov/vote/menu/requirements.html>.

Can I bring someone to help me vote?

- Yes. If you need help reading in English, you can bring a person into the voting booth to help you vote. You can bring any person except your employer, an agent of your employer, your union representative, or a candidate running in the election. The person you bring does not need to be a registered voter.

Can I receive assistance in Spanish?

- If you live in Salt Lake County, you are entitled to a Spanish language ballot and assistance in Spanish.

What if my name is not on the list of voters?

- If your name is not on the list, or there is a problem with your ID, you have the right to vote on a provisional ballot. Be sure to ask for a provisional ballot if there is a problem at the polling place.
