

YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN WISCONSIN

Election Day: Tuesday, November 6, 2018 Polls Will Be Open 7 A.M. to 8 P.M.



Who Can Vote?

- In order to vote in the election on November 6, you must be registered to vote.
- If you are not already registered to vote, you may register <u>by mail</u> by October 17, 2018 or <u>in-person</u> by November 2, 2018. You may also register on Election Day at your <u>local polling place</u>.

- To register to vote in Wisconsin:
 - You must live in Wisconsin, be a U.S. citizen, and be age 18 or older on Election Day;
 - You must have lived at your present address for at least 10 days before the election;
 - You must not be serving any portion of a felony sentence (including prison, supervision, probation, or parole); and not have been barred from voting by a court.

How do I register to vote?

- You may register to vote at your city clerk's office, with a special registration deputy, or at the polling place on Election Day. Find your city clerk at: <u>https://myvote.wi.gov/en-US/MyMunicipalClerk</u>.
- You may register to vote by mail using the application available at: <u>https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/RegisterToVote</u>.
- When you register to vote, you will need to prove that you live in Wisconsin with a document that shows your name and home address. You can use a current Wisconsin driver's license or identification (ID) card, ID issued by a Wisconsin government body, employee photo ID (but not a business card), real estate tax bill from the current year or the year before, utility bill dated within the last 90 days, bank statement, paycheck or paystub, or a government document that lists your name and home address. You may use a current apartment lease as proof of home address if you register to vote in-person, but not if you register to vote by mail.

When and where do I vote?

- You can vote early at your municipal clerk's office on weekdays from October 24 until November 4.
- On Election Day, November 6, the polls are open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Do I need to show ID to vote on Election Day?

• Yes. You may use a Wisconsin driver's license (even if your driving privileges are revoked or suspended), Wisconsin ID card, military ID, U.S. passport or passport card, or one of the following types of photo ID: certificate of naturalization (issued no earlier than two years before Election Day), ID card issued by a federally recognized Indian tribe in Wisconsin (can be expired or unexpired), driver license receipt issued by Wisconsin (valid for 45 days from date issued), ID card receipt issued by Wisconsin (valid for 45 days from date issued), or Veteran Affairs ID card. Can I bring someone to help me vote?

• Yes. If you need help reading or understanding English, you can bring a person of any age to help you vote. You can bring any person that you want except your employer or your union representative.

Can I receive assistance in Spanish?

• You are entitled to a Spanish language ballot and assistance in Spanish if you live in the cities of Arcadia, Madison, or Milwaukee.

Can I vote by mail?

• You can request a mail ballot if you are a registered voter. Return your completed ballot as soon as possible because ballots must be delivered no later than Election Day, November 6, to be counted. Request a ballot at: https://elections.wi.gov/voters/absentee.

What if my name is not on the list of voters?

• If your name is not on the list or your right to vote is challenged, you have the right to vote using a provisional ballot. Be sure to ask for a provisional ballot if there is a problem at the polling place.
