



## **YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN FLORIDA**

### **Election Day: Tuesday, November 3, 2020**

#### **Who can vote?**

- In order to vote in the election on November 3, 2020, you must be registered to vote. The deadline to register to vote was October 6, 2020. You can find out if you are registered here: <https://registration.elections.myflorida.com/CheckVoterStatus>
- To register to vote:
  - You must live in Florida, live in the county in which you want to register to vote, be a U.S. citizen, and be age 18 or older on Election Day.
  - If previously convicted of a felony, you may not vote until you have completed your sentence and paid all fines, including court costs and fees.

#### **Can I vote by mail?**

- Any registered voter in Florida may request to vote by mail.
- Contact your [local Supervisor of Elections](#) by mail, email, fax, phone, in-person, or online application to request a mail ballot. The deadline for the Supervisor of Elections to receive a mail ballot request is October 24 at 5:00pm.
- To request a mail ballot, submit your mail ballot application as early as possible.

#### **How do I vote in person?**

- You can **vote early between October 24 and October 31**; some counties may extend these dates. The list of early voting locations and their hours is here: <https://dos.myflorida.com/elections/for-voters/voting/early-voting/>.
- On **Election Day, Tuesday, November 3**, the polls are open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. On Election Day, you must vote at your local polling place. Find your polling place at: <https://registration.elections.myflorida.com/CheckVoterStatus>.
- If you have one, you must present a current and valid photo identification (ID) to vote at the polls. If your photo ID isn't signed you must present additional ID with your signature. Acceptable photo IDs are: Florida driver's license, Florida DMV- issued ID, U.S. passport, debit or credit card, military ID, student ID, retirement center or neighborhood association ID, public assistance ID, U.S. Dept. of Veterans Affairs health ID, license to carry a concealed weapon, or any government employee ID.
- If you don't have a photo ID on Election Day, you can still vote by provisional ballot, but the signature on your provisional ballot must match the signature in your voter registration record.

#### **Can I bring someone to help me vote?**

- Yes. If you need help reading in English, you can bring a person into the voting booth to help you vote. You can bring any person that you want except your employer or your union representative. The person you bring does not need to be a registered voter.

#### **Can I receive assistance in Spanish?**

#### **What if my name is not on the list of voters?**

- If your name is not on the list, or there is a problem with your ID, you have the right to vote on a provisional ballot. Be sure to ask for a provisional ballot if you do not receive a regular ballot.
