

# YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN INDIANA

Election Day: **Tuesday, November 3, 2020** Polls Will Be Open **6 A.M. to 6 P.M.** 

#### Who Can Vote?

- You can vote if you are a U.S. Citizen, are at least 18 years old on Election Day, and have lived at your address for at least 30 days before the election.
- The deadline to register to vote was **October 5**.

# Can I vote by mail?

- You can apply to vote by mail **if** you: will be away from the county on Election Day, work during all Election Day polling hours, are over 65, disabled, or meet certain other qualifying reasons.
- Apply for a vote-by mail ballot and see the full list of qualifying reasons at: https://www.in.gov/sos/elections/2402.htm.
- Apply for a mail ballot right away so that your application will arrive at the election office by October 22.
- To be counted, your voted ballot must be returned and received by the election office by **noon on November 3**.

### When and where do I vote in person?

- Early in-person voting at your county election office runs from October 6 through November 2.
- The polls are open 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Election Day, **November 3**.

#### Do I need to show ID to vote?

- Yes. If you have one, you must show a photo ID issued by Indiana or the U.S. government. You can use an ID that expired in the last two years. If you do not have a photo ID and are low-income or have a religious objection to being photographed, you can still vote a provisional ballot but you will have to visit the county election office by November 13, 10 days after election day, to confirm your exemption.
- If you vote by mail, normally you do not need to show ID. You do have to show ID if you are voting for the first time and you registered to vote by mail and did not include ID with your mail registration.

# Can I bring someone to help me vote?

• Yes. If you need help reading or understanding English, you can bring a person of any age to help you vote. You can bring anyone except your employer or your union representative. If you are bringing someone, you should notify the poll officials before you enter the voting booth.

## What if my name is not on the list of voters?

• If your name is not on the list or your right to vote is challenged, you have the right to vote using a provisional ballot. Ask for a provisional ballot if you do not receive a regular ballot.
