



YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN NORTH CAROLINA

Election Day: Tuesday, November 3, 2020

Who Can Vote?

- In order to vote in the election on November 3, you must be registered to vote. The deadline to register to vote was October 9. You can find out if you are registered here: <https://vt.ncsbe.gov/RegLkup/>
- To register to vote:
 - You must live in North Carolina, be a U.S. citizen, and be age 18 or older on Election Day.
 - You must not have been convicted of a felony unless your civil rights have been formally restored.

Can I vote by mail?

- Yes, any North Carolina voter may vote-by-mail. If you want to vote by mail, election officials must receive your mail ballot request by **October 27**.

- If you want to vote by mail, submit your mail ballot application as early as possible.

How do I vote in person?

- You can **vote early between October 15 and October 31**. The list of early voting locations and their hours is posted here: <https://vt.ncsbe.gov/ossite/>
- On Election Day, **Tuesday, November 3**, the polls are open 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.
- Voters will not be required to show photo ID for the 2020 elections. Federal and state courts have temporarily blocked North Carolina's voter photo ID requirement until further notice.

Can I bring someone to help me vote?

- Yes. If you need help reading in English, you can bring a person into the voting booth to help you vote. You can bring any person that you want except your employer or your union representative. The person you bring does not need to be a registered voter.

Can I receive assistance in Spanish?

- The state is not required to provide Spanish-language assistance, but if you need help reading in English, you can bring a person into the voting booth to help you vote.

What if my name is not on the list of voters?

- If your name is not on the list, or there is a problem accepting you as a voter, you have the right to vote on a provisional ballot. Be sure to ask for a provisional ballot if you do not receive a regular ballot.
