

YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN WISCONSIN



Election Day: **Tuesday, November 3, 2020** Polls Will Be Open 7 A.M. to 8 P.M.

Who Can Vote?

- You must be registered in order to vote in an election.
- You can register to vote if you are a U.S. citizen, are at least 18 years old, have lived at your address for at least 28 days before the election, and are not serving any portion of a felony sentence.
- Here is how you can register to vote:
 - By mail or online by **October 14**.
 - In person at your municipal clerk's office by October 30.
 - In person at your local polling place on Election Day.

- Register online or request a voter application at: <u>https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us</u>.

Can I vote by mail?

- You can apply to vote-by-mail if you are registered to vote.
- Apply for a vote-by mail ballot at: <u>https://elections.wi.gov/voters/absentee</u>
- Your application <u>must be received</u> by the election office by 5 p.m. on October 29.
- To be counted, your voted ballot must be returned and received by 8 p.m. on November 3.

When and where do I vote in-person?

- The polls are open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Election Day, November 3.

- You can vote in-person at your local municipal clerk's office up to two weeks before the election.

Do I need to show ID to vote on Election Day?

- Yes. You must show a Wisconsin driver's license or ID card, military ID, U.S. passport or passport card, or one of the following unexpired photo IDs: certificate of naturalization (issued within the last 2 years), an ID card issued by a federally recognized Indian tribe in Wisconsin, or Veteran Affairs ID card.

Can I bring someone to help me vote?

• Yes. If you need help reading or understanding English, you can bring a person of any age to help you vote. You can bring any person that you want except your employer or your union representative.

Can I receive assistance in Spanish?

• You have the right to a Spanish ballot and help in Spanish if you live in Arcadia, Madison, or Milwaukee.

What if my name is not on the list of voters?

• If you do not have ID or your right to vote is challenged, you can vote using a provisional ballot.
