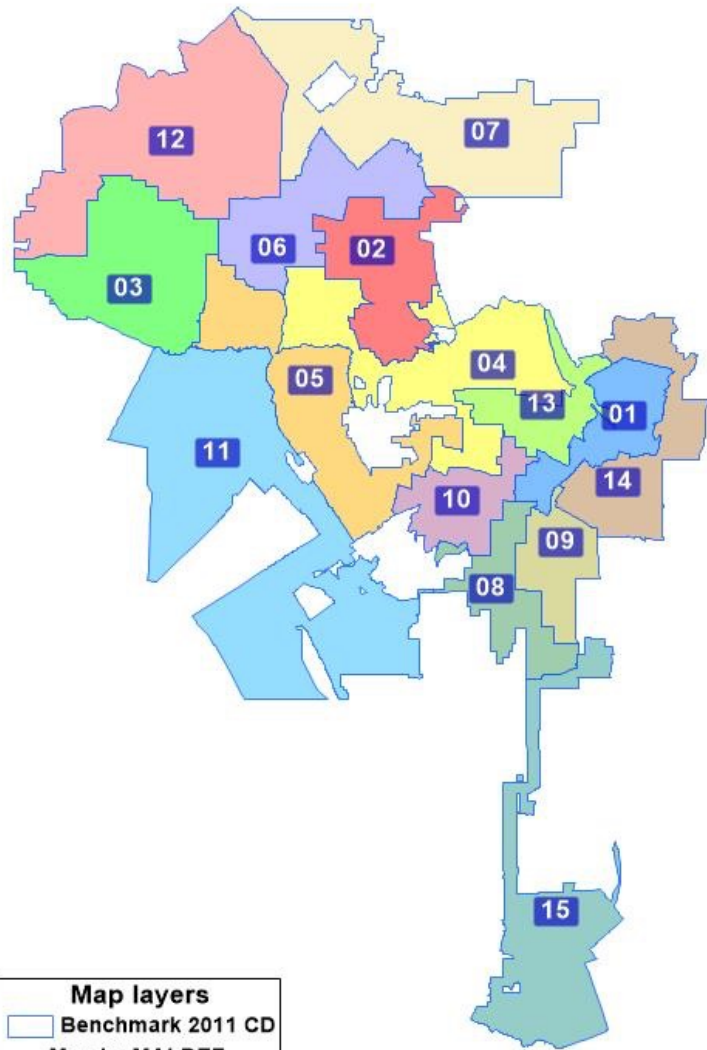
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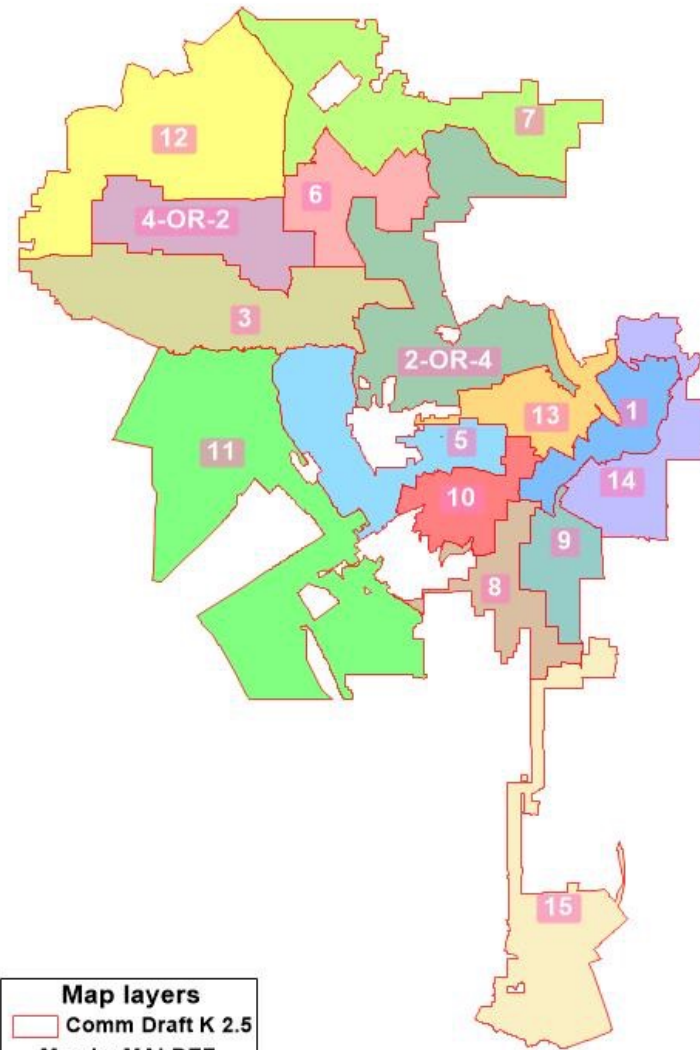
MALDEF Redistricting Principles

 - Comply with the U.S. Constitution
 - Comply with the Federal Voting Rights Act
 - Respect as many Communities of Interests as complying with the law allows
- *If Necessary, Litigate*

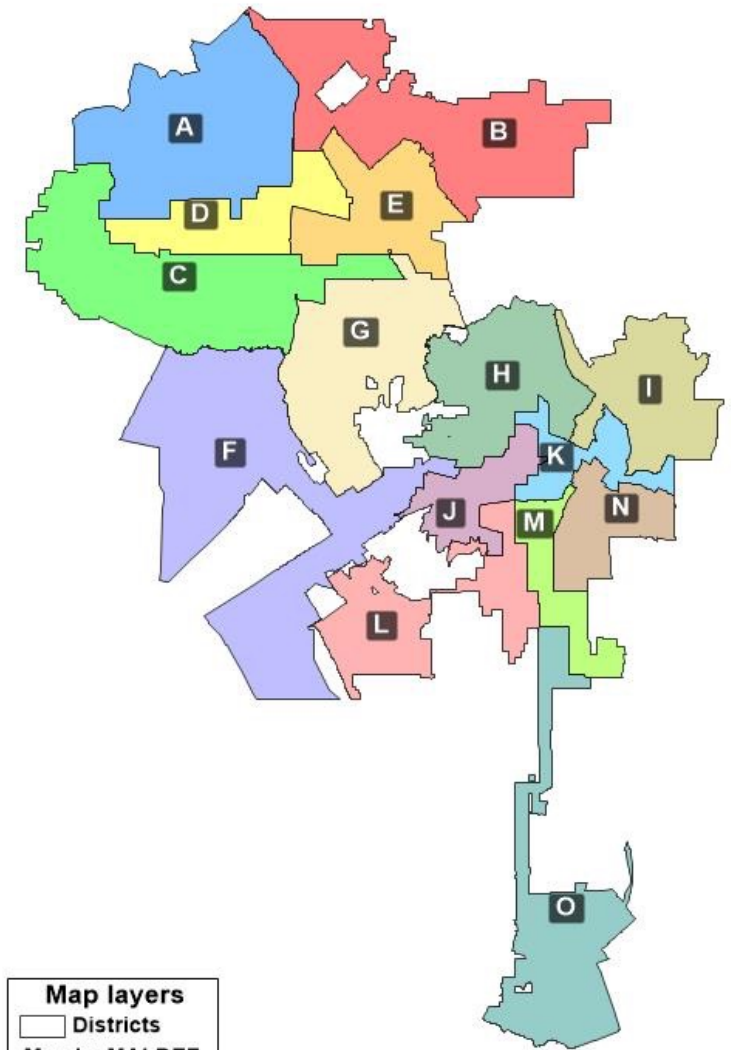
Plan Comparison – Benchmark, K 2.5, and MALDEF



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MALDEF Plan Overall Features

- ❑ One Person, One Vote
 - ❑ Total Plan Deviation Range is 8.19% (-3.88% to +4.31)
 - ❑ SWDB Adjusted PL94-171 Data
- ❑ Creates Minority Opportunity Districts
 - ❑ Creates Six Latino Opportunity Districts in East side and SFV
 - ❑ Benchmark has Four and K2.5 has Four
 - ❑ New Latino opportunity districts in the San Fernando Valley and Eastside Los Angeles
 - ❑ Retains Three Black Opportunity Districts
- ❑ Key Community of Interest Features
 - ❑ Uses Neighborhood Councils as community of interest boundaries
 - ❑ Koreatown Neighborhood Council united whole in one district
 - ❑ Northeast Los Angeles united whole in one district
 - ❑ Remainder portions of the San Fernando Valley place in only one district

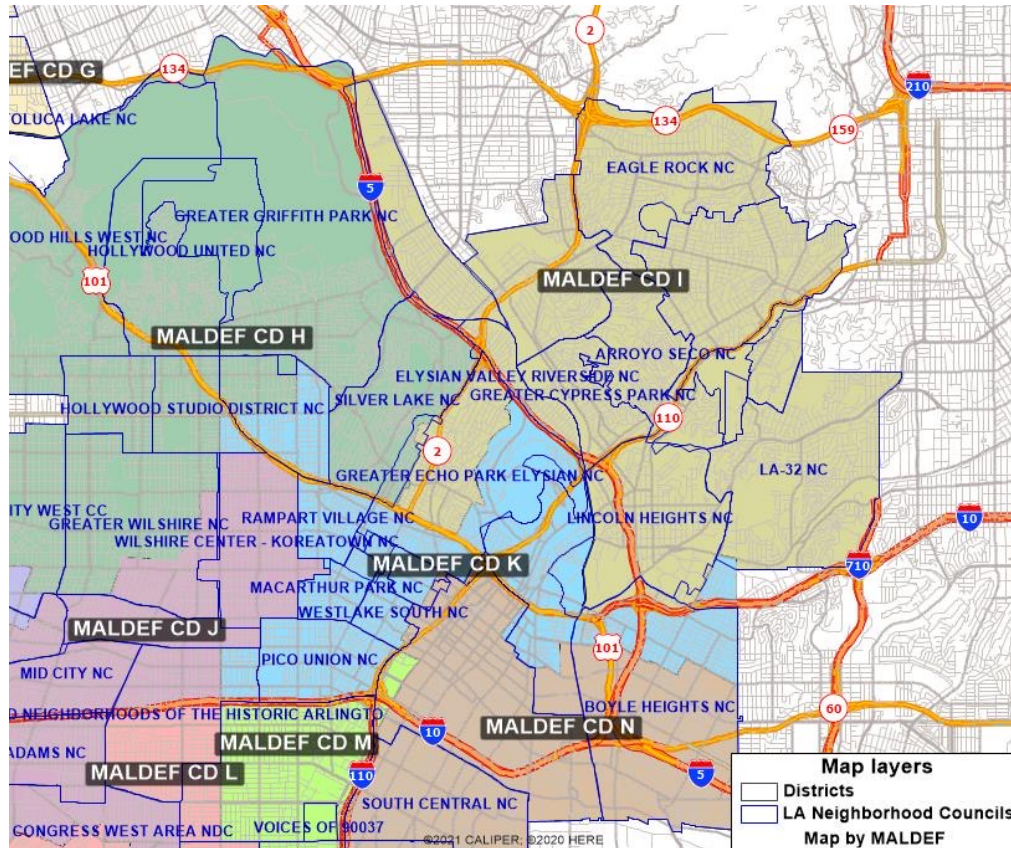

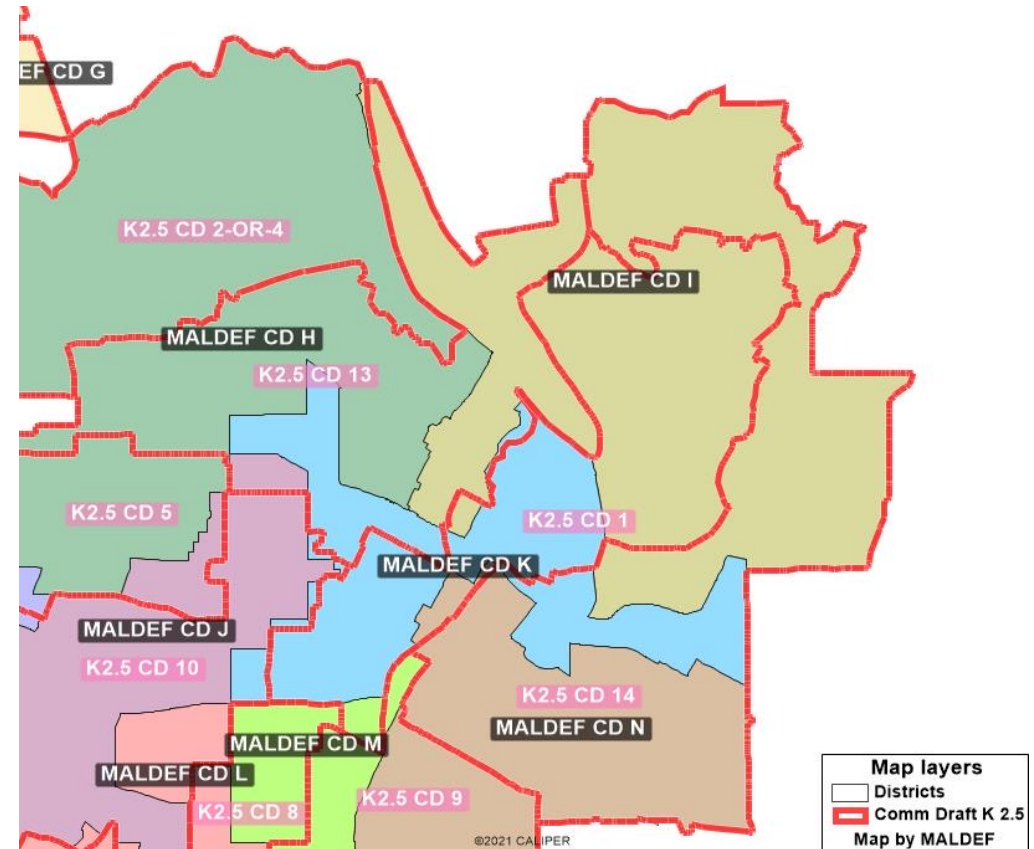
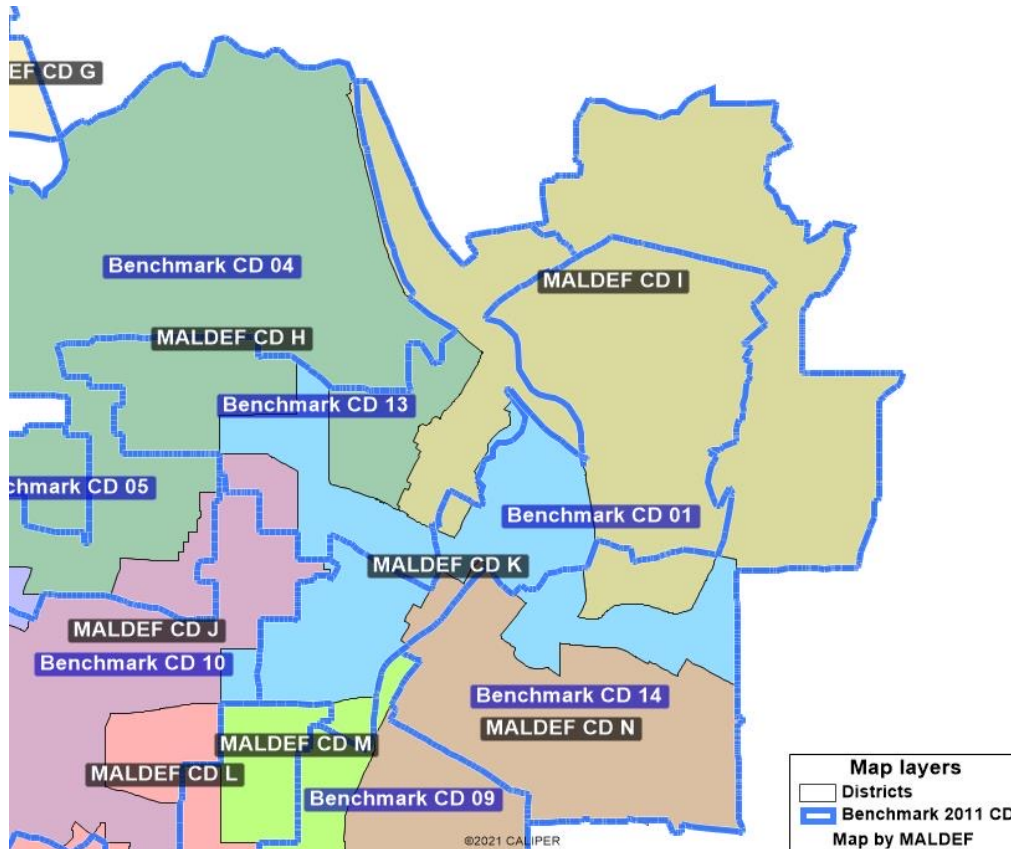
Map Considerations

- Under-populated Benchmark districts
- Large Latino population requiring three effective districts
- Growing Asian population, which is historically separated
- Latino opportunity districts bordering on historic Black opportunity districts

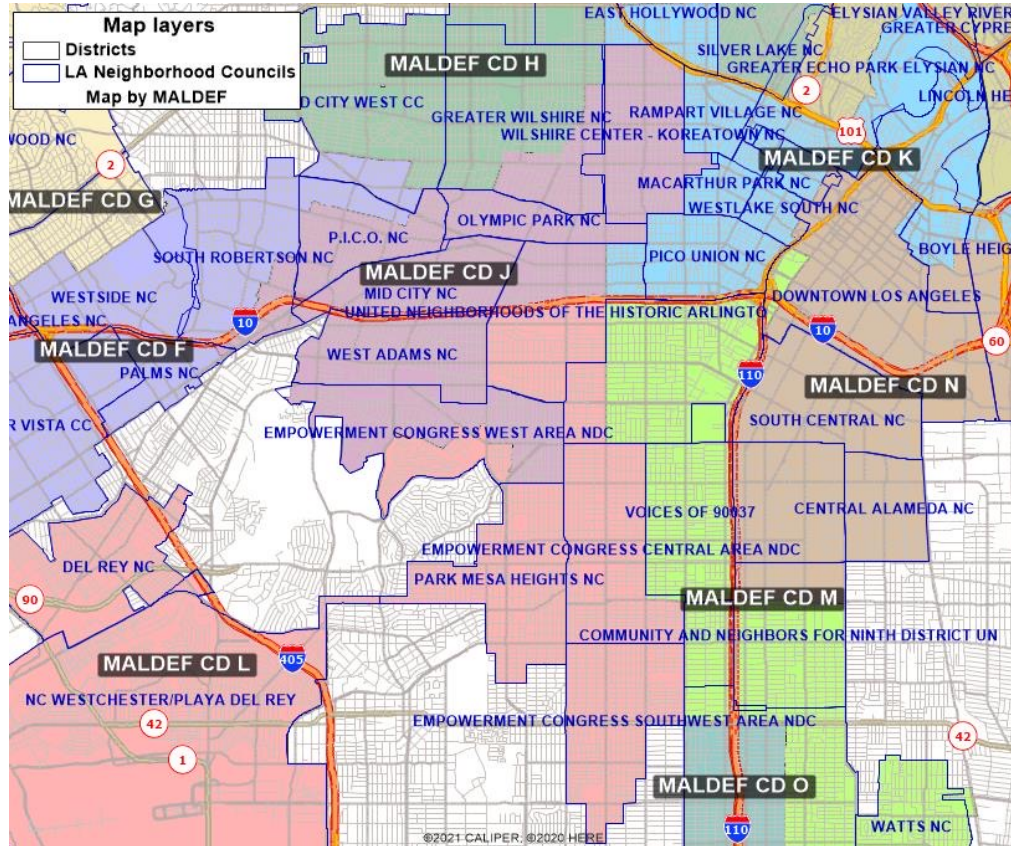
Map Highlights

- Creates three Latino opportunity districts
- Unites the Northeast communities in CD I
- Makes compact CD N around the downtown
- Chinatown, Little Tokyo, and Filipinotown united in CD K

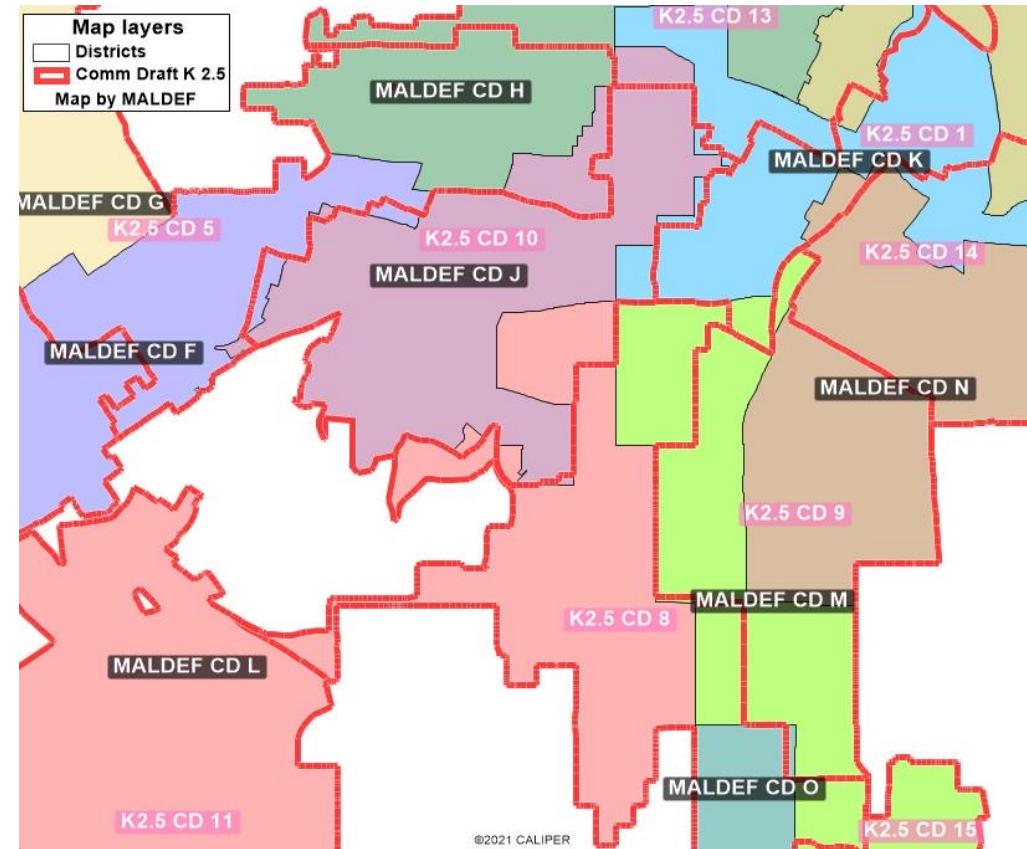
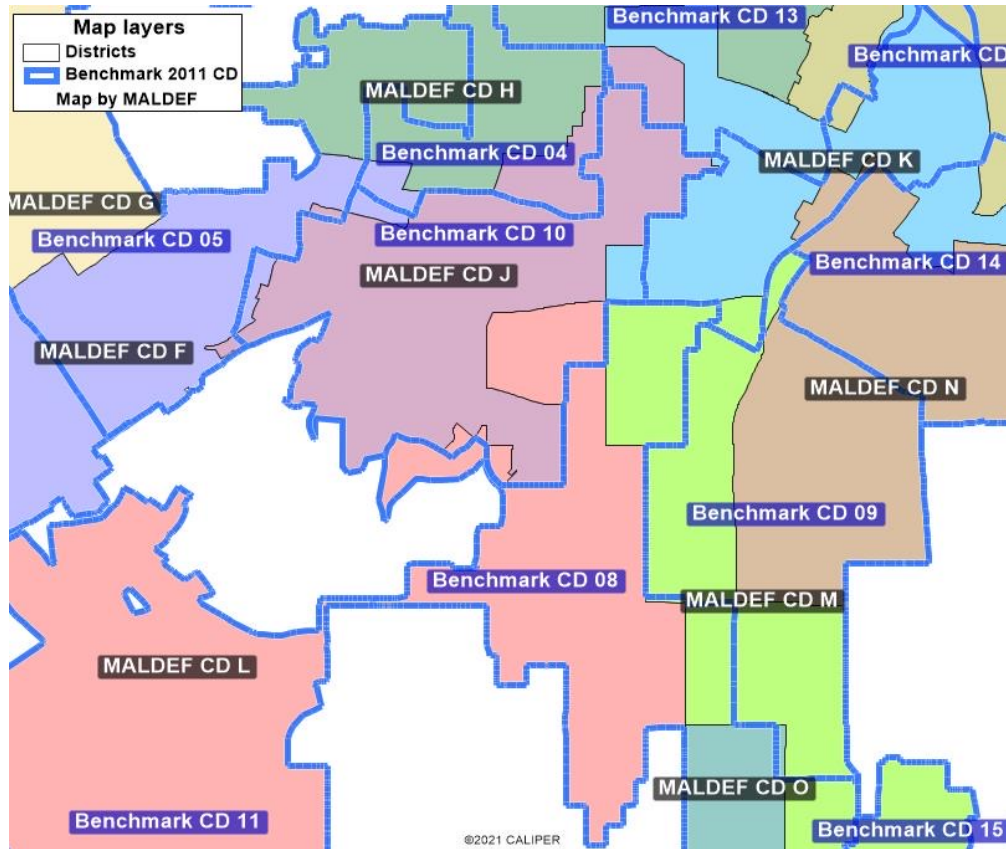
Map Considerations

- Contains historic Black opportunity districts
- Large Latino population in Eastside/South LA
- Split of Koreatown

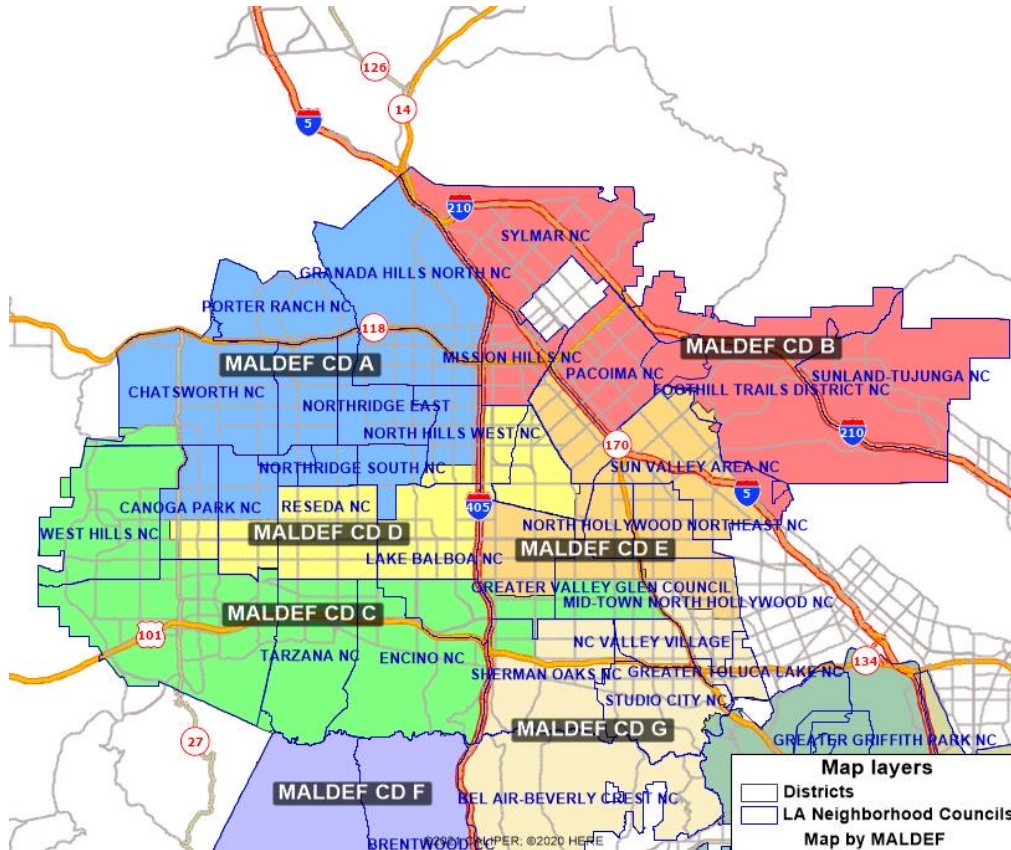
Map Highlights

- Preserves historic Black opportunity districts, while still allowing for Latino opportunity districts to be created in Eastside
- Unites Koreatown in CD J
- Maintains USC/Exposition Park and moves Watts in CD M
- Places LAX in CD L for population needs
 - Complements community requests at statewide levels and potential response for adding valuable assets

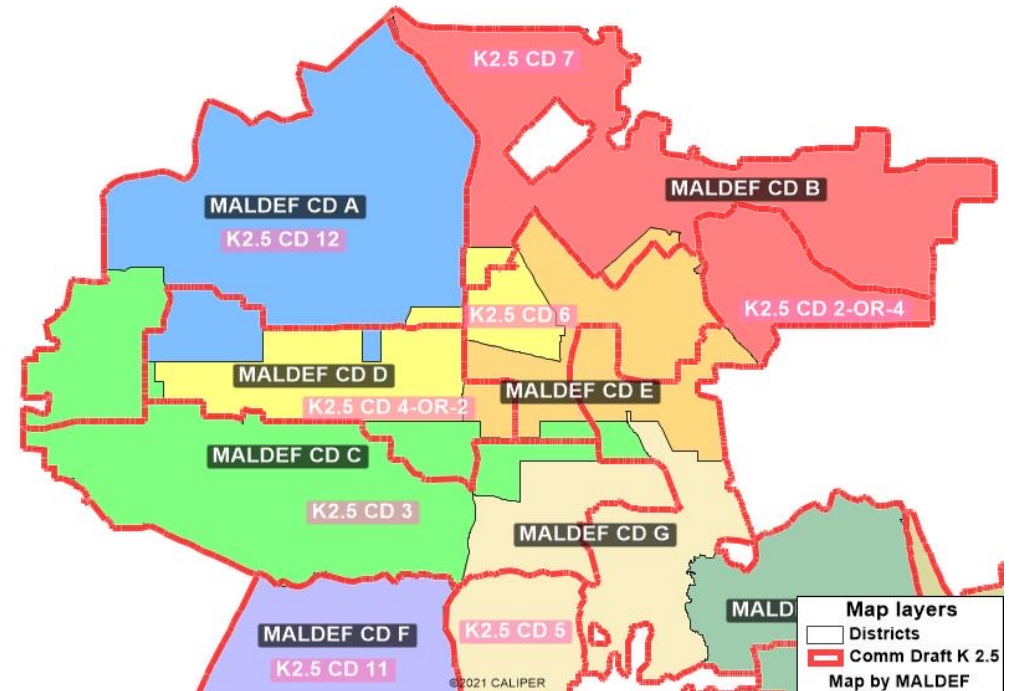
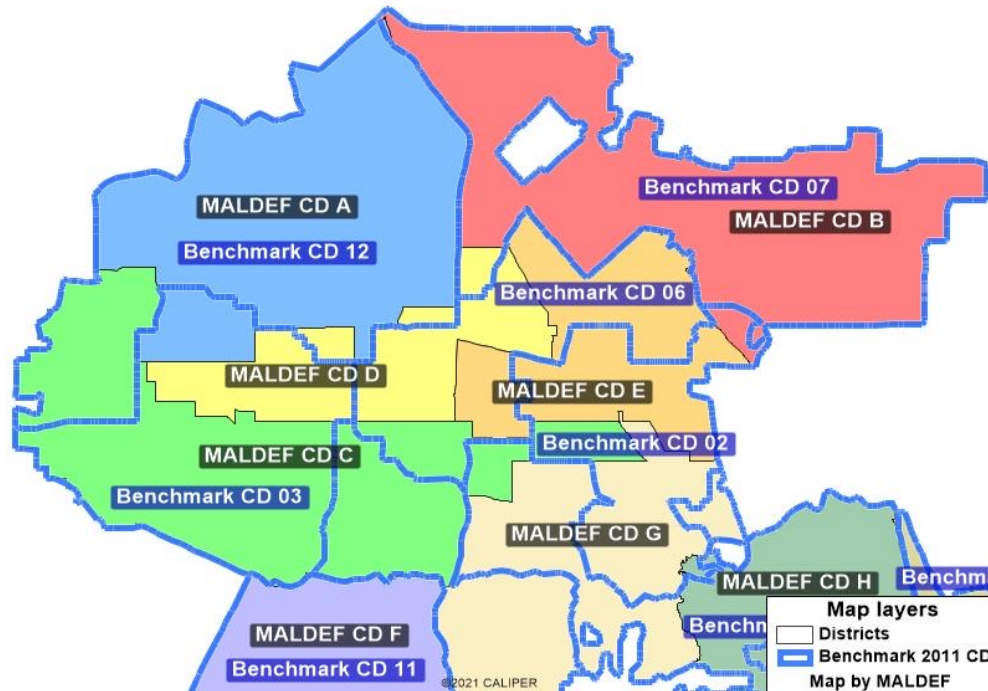
Map Considerations

- Total Population growth in SFV
- Latino Population growth in SFV
- Numerous South SFV splits to West/Center City

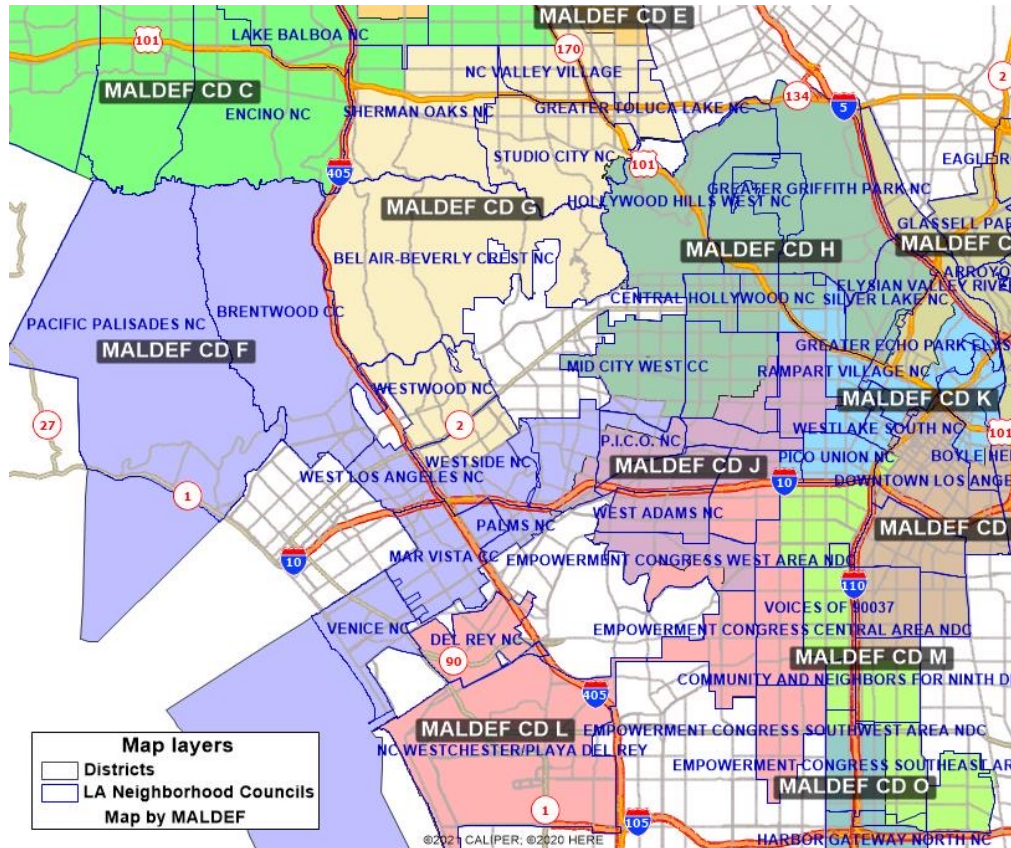
Map Highlights

- Creates additional Latino opportunity district (CD D)
- Only one SFV district is paired with another part of the City (CD G) compared to 3 in Benchmark and 2 in K2.5

MALDEF West Side and Mid-City



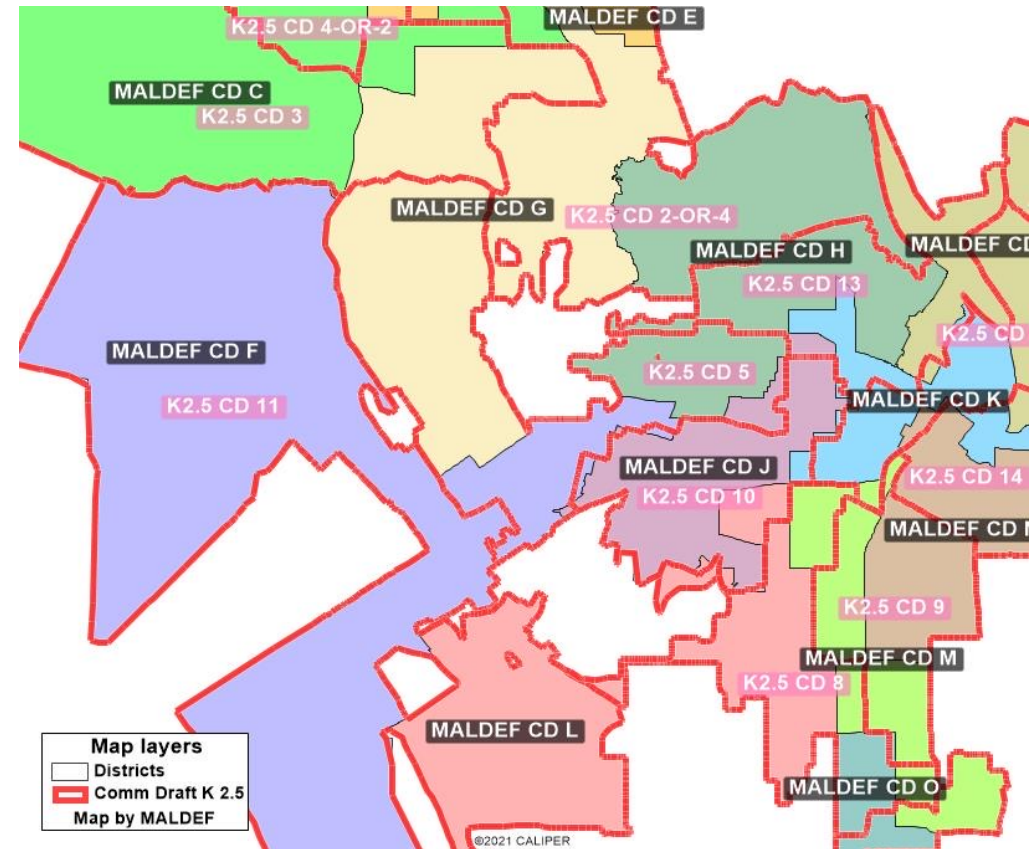
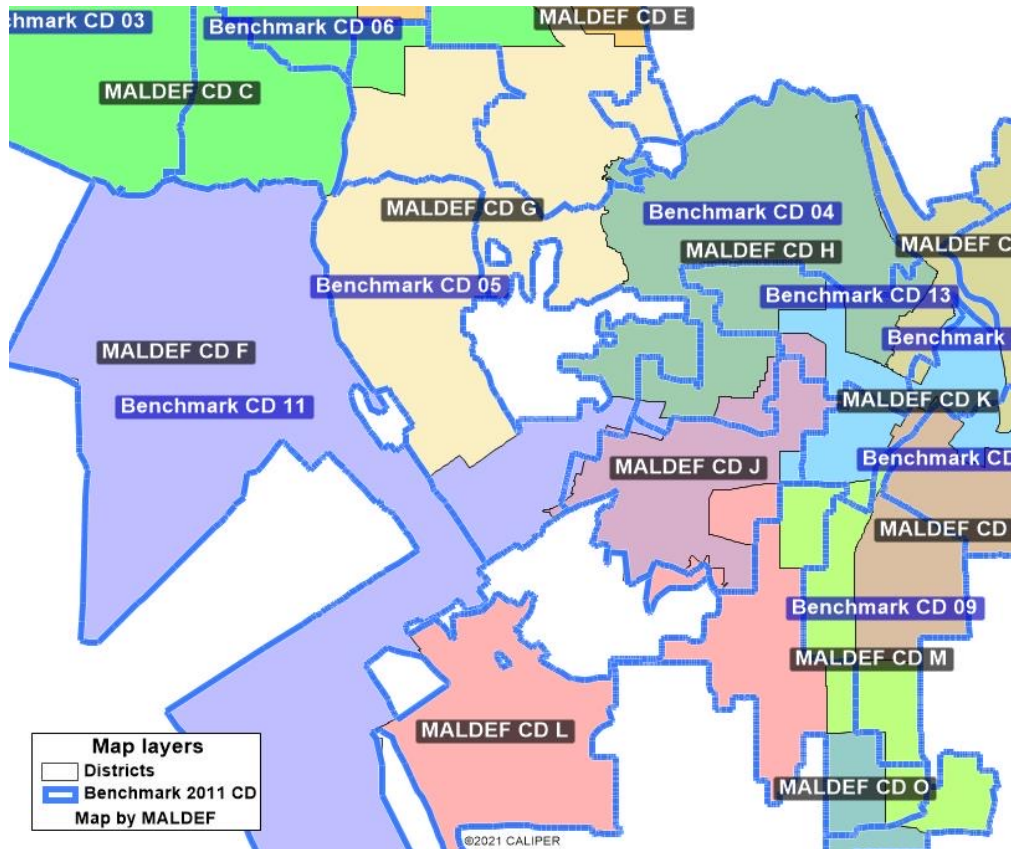
Map Considerations

- Organize remainder of city in a reasonable manner, given SFV, East, and South side considerations

Map Highlights

- Only one SFV crossover district; Stops at Valley Village/Studio City with Westwood (United by I-405)
- Compact Mid-city/Hollywood/Silverlake District H
