

YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN MICHIGAN

PROTECT OUR VOTE * * * * * *

Election Day: **Tuesday, November 5, 2024** Polls Will Be Open 7 A.M. to 8 P.M.

Who Can Vote?

- You can vote if you are a U.S. citizen, are at least 18 years old on Election Day, a resident of the township or city for at least 30 days when you vote, are not serving a sentence in jail or prison, and are registered to vote.
- You can register:
 - o *In-person* any time up to 8 p.m. on November 5, Election Day at your city or township clerk's office; find your clerk here: https://mvic.sos.state.mi.us/Voter/Index/#yourclerk
 - o **By mail** postmarked by **October 15** to your city or township clerk's office. The registration form is here: https://www.michigan.gov/sos/resources/forms
 - o *Online* by October 15 at https://mvic.sos.state.mi.us/registervoter

Can I vote by mail?

- Yes. Registered voters can vote by mail OR vote in person.
- If you wish to vote by mail, apply for an absentee ballot: https://mvic.sos.state.mi.us/Home/VoteAtHome
- Your absentee ballot application <u>must be received</u> by the election office by **5 p.m. on November 1**.
- To be counted, your voted absentee ballot must be <u>received</u> by your local clerk's office or their secure drop box by **8 p.m. on November 5**.

When and where do I vote in person?

- You can vote early in person at your city or township clerk's office starting October 26 and ending on November 3. Find your clerk here: https://mvic.sos.state.mi.us/Voter/Index/#yourclerk
- You can vote in person on Election Day at the polls, which are open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on November 5.

Do I need to show ID to vote on Election Day?

- You can show photo ID or sign a statement affirming that you do not have ID with you.
- Acceptable ID includes: a driver's license from MI or another state, a federal, state, county or local government ID card, U.S. passport, military ID, photo ID from an educational institution, or tribal photo ID.

Can I bring someone to help me vote?

• Yes. If you need help reading or understanding English, you can bring a person of any age to help you vote. You can bring any person that you want <u>except</u> your employer, your union representative, or any of their agents.

Can I receive assistance in Spanish?

• You have the right to a Spanish ballot and help in Spanish if you live in Clyde, Colfax, or Fennville.

What if my name is not on the list of voters?

• If your name is not on the list or your right to vote is challenged, you have the right to vote using a provisional ballot. Ask for a provisional ballot if you do not receive a regular ballot.
